January Outing Report

The first 2018 outing was to **Nielsen Park** and **Duggan Park**. We met at 6.30 and were delighted that Ram, who found us through Facebook, came along as a visitor. Barbara and Rob; Penny and Helen made long journeys to join us. The fifteen of us set off through the south side of Nielsen Park on a cloudy

and cool morning.

Many of our birds decided it was too dry to show their faces after 2-3 three weeks without any decent rain. Even the Tawny Frogmouths, who just two days before, were such a delight, remained hidden.

Ram and a few others snapped away while Rob Brodribb (the Coordinator) was able to share what "The Friends of Nielsen Park" had achieved over the years, in encouraging natural regeneration.

We inspected Satin Bowerbird bowers (a first for some) and active Brush Turkey's mounds.

After this we headed off to Duggan Park where Michael showed us the pathway through the bushland and up to Multuggerah's Lookout where we had excellent views of Tabletop Mountain. Some enjoyed the views while others found a few more birds.

The highlight of the outing was sighting a Pacific Baza and Brown Goshawk both soaring over the trees at the same time and also catching a glimpse of two Yellow-tailed Black-cockatoos flying over.



Myall Park—Planned August Outing

August Campout, 18th and 19th at Myall Park Botanic Garden

MPBG is Queensland Heritage listed and is also a member of the Queensland Botanic Trail. The garden was originally part of the Myall Park grazing property before being gifted to the people of Qld by Mr David Gordon, AM, owner of this property. It is presently run by a trust and looked after by many volunteers.

David (preferred Dave) Gordon was passionate about Australian Native plants and sourced them from many areas of Australia, particularly arid and semi-arid areas. The most popular grevillea is the Robyn Gordon developed perchance here at MPBG and found by David Gordon, giving Australia a hardy and much loved native plant. It is named in honour of his daughter, Robyn, who died tragically at such a young age,16. The Grevilleas, Sandra, Merinda (daughters) and Dorothy (wife) were also developed perchance here at MPBG. It is principally a garden for native plants but luckily for all of us this attracts many birds, in fact over 200 species have been sighted here at MPBG.

There are waterbirds on the lagoon at the entrance to the park, a number of raptors, many honeyeaters, some night birds (heard by us), parrots, many woodland birds throughout (thornbills, fairywrens, weebills, whistlers, jacky winters, grey shrike thrushes, mistletoe birds, robins, flycatchers, brown quails and if we strike lucky there is a little painted button quail sometimes camped just off one of the tracks!) along with the usual black and whites, choughs, apostles and babblers, it is just such good birding here.

The park is well set out, a loop road allows vehicles to access all areas, including the walks and the bird hide. There is a gallery displaying Dorothy Gordons' artworks, giftshop and historical notes about the garden.

Accommodation is basic but quite adequate, a cottage with one double bed bedroom and two twin bedrooms. The 'quarters', once for the workmen, has 8 single beds and one double bed. There are 5 powered sites available, no water, amenities are a short walk away. Accommodation needs to be booked individually and directly with the park office.
