THE LAST ENEMY.

Casting around for a suitable title this month I recalled an autobiography of the same name written by Richard Hillary before his death in action during 1943. Hillary had fought with distinction as a pilot in the R.A.F. in the epic struggle we now call the Battle of Britain. To him the last enemy to be conquered was fear. The efforts of him and his cohorts are now history and the knowledge of whether or not they conquered the last enemy went with them to their graves.

In these less cataclysmic times we are not faced with such battles. None-theless there are other battles to be fought-- other enemies to be met-- and if those enemies defeat us we will have lost far greater stakes than were fought for in 1940.

For the stakes on the battleground now are the survival of this planet as a life support system for us-- indeed, for all lifeforms.

The enemies take many forms -- the greed for political power -- the hunger for wealth and position of big business -- the need to support the teeming millions which now travel through space on our little green spacecraft.

However, our last enemy, I believe, is not so easily recognized, or defeated. It lurks in the same places as did Hillary's. It lurks in many people without them realizing. It has various names but two will suffice for recognition---apathy---complacency.

Feople must come to grips with the enemy; and not only the people down the street, but the people reading this (and, of course, the person writing it). The popular image today of the apatnetic Aussie is "Norm"; and may I introduce the lady of the duo, "Norma".

A land populated largely by Norms and Normas will stand by while Governments of all political persuasions do (and allow to be done), things which ought not to be done, or which might be done in ways less harmful to our little spacecraft.

However, if Norm and Norma rise up and cry, "Enough", then perhaps those things will not be done. We Aussies live in the best country on God's green Earth, but our children won't, unless we take an interest in something beyond the footy scores, or the cricket, or the horses. A little test to tell how much of Norm or Norma lives with you, is to read the poem by Dorothea Mackellar, "My Country".

The smaller the lump that should rise in your throat, the more of Norm or Norma you carry. If no lump arises, then for you I quote from C.J. Dennis' "The Austra----laise".

"Fellers of Australier,
Blokes an' coves an' coots,
Shift yer ----- carcases,
Move yer -----boots.
Gird yer -----gun,
Get yer----gun,
Set the -----enermy
An' watch the -----run."

246. Western Gerygone. (Gerygone fusca). 10.5.86. Northern Helidon. Michael Atzeni. Laurie Atzeni. Pat McConnell. Common in acacia scrub near the new Helidon Dip; light brown-grey upperparts; white underparts; faint white eyebrow; white tipped tail feathers; white band cross tail base which is distinct when bird hovers; beautiful call, similar to White-throated Gerygone but fainter.

247. White-bellied Sea-Eagle. (Haliaeetus leucogaster).8.6.86. Hood's Lagoon. Michael Atzeni. Pat McConnell. Single bird; probable first year plumage; large raptor; generally pale brown with creamier markings through the plumage; paler on head; in flight, wings held upswept; bullseyes evident; tail short and wedgeshaped.

248. Caspian Tern. (Hydroprogne caspia).8.6.86. Hood's Lagoon. Michael Atzeni. Pat McConnell. Two birds flying over lagoon; large tern with prominent red bill; grey upperparts; white underparts; black crown; black primaries on underwing.

EXECUTIVE NOTES.

We have had several replies to the letters we sent to natural history and conservation associations, concerning the caged Wrens issue. They all express concern and support our stand.

Magpie season is with us again, for a few weeks. Already there are a number of reports of dive-bombing by birds. The Club is working in liaison with the Q.N.P.W.S. at this time, to help them with a project of trapping and banding offending Magpies. Using Q.N.P.W.S. traps we go out to the location and try to catch the male birds, as they are the main culprits. Any birds caught are banded and certain primary feathers are removed from one wing. This allows the bird to fly but not to dive-bomb.

Any members who would like to be involved with this could phone Angela or myself. The Q.N.P.W.S. would like a roster of week-end volunteers. Angela, Audrey Sorenson, Lyn Rowan and myself have already participated.

Although the weather was overcast, with some drizzle, a very pleasant morning of birding was spent at Redwood Park. Graded roads have recently been made through the Park, which makes for easy walking.

We left from the top entrance, following the road as far as the creek, then back-tracked to the road junction, and followed the road down the hill to the bottom entrance. Lesley's idea of leaving our cars at the bottom was a good one, as the walk was then downhill, most of the way.

With so many Eucalypts and Acacias in bloom there was no scarcity of birds. We had several good sightings of the Brown Cuckoo-dove and the colourful Scarlet Honeyeater; also a close view of a male and female Spotted Pardal-ote-- the male collecting nesting material. A koala was seen earlier in the morning.


