Ann Shore has reported excitedly to me hearing a new birdcall emanating from the direction of Redwood Park. It consisted of one note repeated three or four times, followed by another note, possibly three tones lower, also repeated three or four times. The call is particularly even, and most exciting to listen to.

As a birdo of some enthusiasm I could not restrain myself from relating how I heard this call while living at Caboolture. On the very first morning in my new surroundings (so very different from Toowoomba city) I heard this amazing call. I flew out of bed - noticing the time was 4.24 - grabbed my binoculars, and tore out into the rather jungle-like garden. I couldn't find the culprit anywhere. All I could see were a few Noisy Miners.

These antics went on for some weeks. It was always 24 minutes past four when the calls started, and all I could ever find in the garden were a few Noisy Miners.

Finally I satisfied myself that the call was actually made **by** the Miners! But to this day I cannot say whether one bird sings the whole song, or whether it is performed antiphonally by two.

You will be pleased to learn that the calls ceased by the end of November and I was able to sleep a little later!

Seven birdos travelled on to Flagstone Creek, where Superb Fairy-wren and Red-browed Firetail were the highlights.

Thanks to Ron and Nancy for taking us up the Gorman Gap road looking for Glossy Black Cockatoos. Our only sightings were of the Brown Cuckoo-dove, a goanna and a swamp wallaby.

Last bird for the outing was the Mistletoebird, near a beautiful spot on the lower Flagstone Creek road.

A.G.M. & ORDINARY MEETING of OCT 7, 1986

All the proposed Constitutional Changes published in the Newsletter were adopted.

The issue of subscription increases was discussed, the final outcome being: Family Membership \$12, Ordinary Membership \$10, Student Membership \$5, on the condition that the length of the newsletter was reduced in order to save costs.

The ex-Treasurer, Diana Beal, suggested that the Club's financial year be changed to commence at each lst November. This was seen as good sense and recommended to be published so that it could be discussed and voted on at the November outing/ meeting as it involved a Constitutional change.

OUR NEWSLETTER

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As some members already know, many changes are taking place at Lake Dyer, near Laidley, a great haunt of waterbirds, and one which has been frequently monitored by our Club in the last ten years.

Construction work is taking place to transform the lake into a larger water storage to hold 9000 megalitres and cover 110 hectares. The dam is expected to be completed by June 1987.

In addition to the main deep water dam, with spillways, etc, boating facilities and picnic area, the design includes sloped inlets for wildlife reserves and a marshy sanctuary area with an island. There are trees in these sanctuaries, which when dead after being flooded, will be retained for nesting waterbirds. These reserves will be covered with the large amounts of black clay not suitable in the main dam, which are full of nutrients.

On Saturday, 25 October, five members of the Bird Club attended an explanatory meeting on the site, given by involved engineers and officials of the Water Resources Commission and the Lockyer Watershed Management Association.

Club members were happy to see that there was then some water in the remaining still recognisable part of the old lake, contrary to one member's last visit some six weeks earlier when the site appeared completely dry. There were a considerable number of waterbirds present despite the noisy construction work going on all around them. Unfortunately it was not possible to get close enough to identify all the species, except for Black-winged Stilts and Whiskered Terns.

WESTBROOK NOTES

Just a note from Coupers Road. Flocks of Strawnecked Ibis (100-150), with a few White Ibis (5-9) and 2 Glossy Ibis feeding along flats. Wood Ducks, Grey Teal and Black Ducks near Westbrook Creek.

The Nankeen Kestrel and Black-shouldered Kite chased the little flock of Superb Fairy-wrens away. Galahs, Pale-headed Rosellas and Red-rumped Parrots nesting.

The **Crested** Pigeons have two small ones, after they have changed shifts every three hours for a couple of weeks. It was very interesting to watch as just on sunrise we would hear a call, and see a changeover; then about three hours later another call and changeover, and so on until dusk; now quite a few calls and the bird out will come in with feed.
