

# OBSERVATIONS ON A PAIR OF BLACK-SHOULDERED KITES.

A group of Red-rumped Parrots (Psephotus haematonotus) were nesting in Eucalypt trees to the west of the road where Westbrook creek cuts the Wyreema Road. I was observing these birds while taking part in the Toowoomba Bird Club's Bird Count on Sunday, lotter October, 1976.

A pair of Black-shouldered Kites (Elanus notatus) were hunting in the vicinity. On sighting the parrots the kites hovered over the trees where the parrots were nesting One of the kites drifted away about twenty metres and hovered about ten meteres above tree top level. The other kite hovered lower and lower over the parrots until it was directly above and about one metre away from them. This kite started making threatening movements towards the parrots in the tree and at the same time making sharp, high-pitched whistling noises. The parrots were frightened out of their cover and started to fly to a nearby tree. The kite that was hovering up higher took the opportunity and dived at the parrots. The attack was mistimed and the parrots escaped.

Then the kites reversed roles and continued to harass the parrots in this way for some time. This co-operative hunting is all the more noteworthy when it is considered that the kite is usually seen hunting alone.

A herd of 200 Bewick Swans, the largest ever recorded in east Norfolk and more than double the normal winter average has taken possession of a marsh north of the Acle New Road five miles from Yarmouth.

The arrival of the Bewick Swans from the Arctic zone of Russia follows that of smaller herds of Whooper Swans from Iceland and Lapland - birds whose presence in East Anglia is always a sign of a hard winter.

With them have come equally "ominous" birds, White-fronted Geese from Russia and Pink-footed Geese from Iceland.

So many of these and other geese from Siberia are descending on the Wildfowl Trust reserves that an appeal for wheat and barley for emergency rations is being made by Sir Peter Scott's organsiation at Slimbridge in Gloucestershire. Trust officials are distributing seven cwt. of wheat and barley every day to swans, geese and wild duck. They are planning to increase this to nine cwt. in the wake of severe snow in the Gloucester/Cheltenham areas.

#### FIRST ANNUAL BIRD COUNT - TOOWOOMBA BIRD CLUB - 10.10.76.

The weather on the first of our proposed Annual Bird Counts was the deciding factor in the number of birds actually observed. Although sunny, strong winds and cool temperatures kept many species well hidden. Many species normally seen in the area were not observed at all and numbers of individuals of those species recorded were well below normal.

Most notable of the species recorded were the White-breasted Wood-swallow (1) and Masked Wood-swallow (2) both of which were new species for the Toowoomba area and comparatively rare in S.E. Queensland. Both species were recorded below the Great Dividing Range near Blanchview. Other notable species which were only recent additions to the Toowoomba "list" at the time of the count were Tawny Grassbird, Red Wattlebird, Darter, Nankeen Night Heron, Common Bronzewing and Rufous-tailed Bronze Cuckoo. A single Powerful Owl was amongst many species recorded from Redwood Park.

In total 5355 individual birds, comprising 123 species were observed during the day. This was a very creditable count considering the prevailing weather conditions.

This Bird Count, which was arranged to coincide with one organised by the 1.0.5. covered the area usually investigated by Toowoomba Bird Club members viz. that area within a 10 km. radius of the Margaret Street Post Office. This area contains a wide variety of habitats including the Downs scrublands in the west, the Range escarpment of vine-scrub and open eucalypt forest, and the open eucalypt, acacia and dry scrub areas in the east. This variety of habitats resulted in the observation of western species such as the White-winged Chough, vine-scrub and rainforest species such as the Regent Bowerbird, Brown Pigeon, White-headed Pigeon and Powerful Owl, and the migratory species such as the White-breasted and Masked Wood-swallows in the east.

Sixteen Club members comprising eight teams took part in the count. Each team was allocated an area (or areas) within the 10 km. radius and no overlap of areas occurred. All sightings made by each team were confirmed by both members of that team as were all identifications based on call.

The Club wishes to express its thanks to all members who took part in the count and helped to make it a success in spite of the weather. Also our thanks are offered to Dr. L. Boyce for his contributions of sightings made within his rainforest property on the edge of the Range.

It is proposed that Annual Bird Counts will be organised each October and that over the years an overall view of species in this area will be obtained.

A full list of the species observed and the numbers of individuals of each species is attached.

# TOOWOOMBA BIRD CLUB ANNUAL BIRD SUMMARY, 1976.

This first Annual Bird Summary covers the period lst. January to 31st. December, 1976, and is based upon members' sightings during that year.

Sightings are taken over the area contained within a 10 km radius of the Margaret Street Post Office. As outlined in News-sheet No. 9 - July 1976, this circle includes the whole of Redwood and Jubilee Parks, Withcott, Blanchview, much of Flagstone Creek Road, just excludes the Lions' Park on Warwick Road and includes Drayton, Gowrie Junction and the Blue Mountain Estate off the Crow's Nest Road.

At the club's inception in October 1975 an existing list of 131 species identified in our area between June 1973 and October 1975 was adopted as a base upon which to build a comprehensive Toowoomba Bird List. As a matter of record this original 131 have all since been confirmed within the area by members.

During the period October - December 1975, 7 new species were added to the Toowoombalist and during 1976 a further 28 new species were observed, bringing the total list to 166 species as at 31st December 1976.

In all cases details of dates, locales and observers are on record. A new species is not added to the Toowoomba List until it is reliably confirmed by at least two club members.

Reference to News-sheets 1 through 14 will provide full details in respect of the 35 additions for 1975/76.

Eight species identified by club members prior to 1st January 1976 were not recorded during the year. They are: Cattle Egret, Grey Goshawk, Golden Bronze Cuckoo, Noisy Pitta, Satin Flycatcher, Shrike Tit, Spiny-cheeked Honeyeater and White-browed Wood-swallow.

In addition to the 158 species listed below a further four species have been recorded by members during 1976, but unfortunately without the benefit of confirmation by a second member. These species, which have not as yet been admitted to our Toowoomba List, are: Squatter Pigeon (19.1.76), Red-capped Robin (16.6.76), Peregrine Falcon (29.6.76), and Collared Sparrowhawk (3.8.76).

Regrettably, due to a misplacement of information during a change of officers, a portion of the club's records relating to identifications (other than of new Toowoomba birds) during the first four months of 1976 exists only in summary form. Where a species has been recorded during that period but the month of identification may not be reliably stated, the record for that month is represented by an X rather than by the number of the month.
