Weather Conditions : Extremely humid - post thunderstorm, no breeze, 75% cloud cover. Visibility very good. 1.3.1

Comments : Flushed initially from eastern shoreline. Bird took flight, uttering loud " tew, tew, tew " alarm calls the while till landing on the opposite bank. Flight with clipped wingbeat comparable to that of the Marsh Sandpiper, Tringa stagnatalis, but not as fast. Bird nervous and hard to approach, easily flushed. Good views only obtained through telescope. A solitary but Marsh Sandpiper, Sharp-tailed Sandpiper and Black-winged Stilt all closeby for size comparisons. Watched bird for approx. 20 minutes after which time it took to wing landing on small dam to the north on explosives factory land. No evidence of bird following morning -9.30 a.m.(E.S.T.) R.G.H.

A large wader. Long, dark, slightly upturned bill. Grey-green legs trailing beyond tail in flight. White rump onto lower back distinctive during flight. No wingbars. Similar Species : Marsh Sandpiper, Tringa stagnatalis, a smaller species with a long needle-like bill (also present this day for comparison).

## TOOWOOMBA BIRD CLUB NOVEMBER OUTING - LOCKYER WETLANDS.

One of the more esoteric " advantages " of the recent drought was capitalised upon by Toowoomba Bird Club members on the November outing. As a direct consequence of the drear conditions the executive had previously decided on a change of venue from Redwood Park, our usual " end of year " birding destination. There had been a general shift in bird populations because of the harsh climatic conditions. Redwood Park was desolate of its usual frugivores and, conversely, the local wetlands had a concentration of waterfowl because of the general dissipation of surface water occasioned by the drought. It was of this situation that we were able to take full advantage, recording 77 species for the day, with approximately 50% of the species sighted being waterbirds. As Toowoomba is land-locked with an absence of suitable habitat, especially for wading birds many members had a unique opportunity to observe such birds with quite a few " firsts " being added to many personal lists.

The outing commenced at 6.30 a.m. E.ST., 24.11.91 by Gatton Apex Lake where a rewarding hour was passed with the observing of such as Glossy Ibis, Wandering Whistling-Duck, Latham's Snipe and Marsh and Sharp-tailed Sandpiper. From here we travelled directly to the backwaters of Atkinson's Lagoon recording Pallid Cuckoo and Australian Brush-turkey en route. The receding waters of the lagoon had exposed extensive mudflats, those areas greatly beloved by "waderphiles ". Here we weren't to be disappointed, recording eleven species of this type; Red-capped Plover, Red-necked Avocet, Marsh, Sharp-tailed and Curlew Sandpipers, Red-necked Stint and Latham's Snipe being the more noteworthy. Sandpipers were particularly abundant probing the flats, allowing close scrutiny by binocular and telescope. Large flocks of Whiskered Terns in every aspect of breeding plumage wheeled the waters and a single non-breeding White-winged Tern was noted 'midst their complement. -1 : 1

The highlight of the day was our sighting of a lone Bar-tailed Godwit, an unusual species inland but prevalent on coastal mudflats. The closely related Black-tailed Godwit is more likely to be encountered here, several sightings of this species having been

reported locally of late. Searching available literature, Storr and Roberts, I can find no reference to the Bar-tailed Godwit having been recorded in the Lockyer Valley previous. "The Atlas of Australian Birds " does record this species in the self same area of which I write but the records are scant, the reporting rate being less than 11% i.e. " the percentage of record sheets in the Field Atlas on which a given species was recorded. "This was a good record for members who summonsed the energy in the, by then, oppressive mid-day heat. Lunch was taken in the picnic area and events curtailed thereafter. On the homeward bound journey an unusual sight presented itself in a small farm dam adjacent the picnic area entrance. Telescopes revealed a wisp of 20+ Latham's Snipe festooning a rocky islet in the middle of the dam, a fitting end to the day. Now that the rains are upon us it may be several years before such an opportunity again presents itself to us in the Lockyer Valley.

# UPDATED CHECKLIST AND "NEW OR UNUSUAL BIRD REPORT FORM"

Due to the influx of new species recorded in the Toowoomba district this year, the decision was made to update our area check-list. A copy of the new check-list is enclosed. As you will see, the new check-list retains the format of the old check-list with one notable addition: The introduction of a "New or Unusual Bird Report Form", to be submitted in conjunction with certain sightings, indicated upon the check-list by an asterisk. These forms, obtainable from the Record's Officer when required, are to be submitted along with check-lists in the usual fashion. The new or unusual sightings will then be assessed by the Rarities Committee and either accepted or rejected from inclusion in club records.

o see This may sound very draconian, but it will bring our club into line with the nation's most respectable ornithological clubs, and serves two important purposes with regard to our own club records :

Training 1. It will ensure that false identifications of unusual birds do not enter club

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a/ 22. Will facilitate the collection of interesting data relating to the sightings of all all and unusual birds by our club over the years. For example, instead of our records all simply indicating that a Black-tailed Godwit (eg) was sighted in February 1983, they will in future indicate that the bird was alone, that it arrived in dry weather

conditions, that it appeared nervous and edgy, had worn feathers, and was gone on relater three days residency (13-15th Feb) at Hoods Dam. The forms may even note on how the bird was feeding, interacting with other waders etc.

Assessment by the Rarities Committee will apply to new bird sightings as well as the unusual sightings indicated upon the check-list. This should in no way discourage members from indicating an unusual bird upon their monthly check-list if they believe they have seen it. Conversely, this form provides us all with a chance to describe our great sighting in detail, and contribute to the club's data-base on birds of the Toowoomba area. Any members wishing to, but currently not receiving check-lists for monthly submission are invited to contact the Editor.

# "OVERSEAS TRIP 1991 - Part 1"

Forewarned that the English summer was wet and very cool, I stuffed my bags with rainwear and warm clothing before leaving for the U.K. in mid August. However, I took the sunshine with me and wished I hadn't taken the Jeremiahs quite so literally. •1° 1,

Spending most of my time deep in the country there were ample opportunities for birdwatching in odd moments wherever I went. Quiet walks in the Sussex woodland yielded Chiff Chaffs, Tree Creepers, Blue and Great Tits, a Blackcap and a Nuthatch cracking nuts it had wedged into bark crevices. An ancient woodland of Sweet Chestnut, Oak, Alder and much else, now bearing scars and open spaces, sad reminders of the fearful Autumn storm of October 1987 which wreaked such havoc in South-eastern England. The open glades replanted with Oak saplings amid other signs of rejuvenation and the whole wood alive with sound of active wildlife and birdsong.

Early mornings from a high window gave glimpses of Long-tailed Tits, perky Robins, and Greenfinches searching for Blackberries and seeds; the twittering of tiny brightly-T coloured Goldfinches as they hunted for thistle-heads, and Blackbirds, head on one side, 3 listening as they inspected fresh mole-hills for worms, while plump Wood Pigeons flew 2 over or sat in the tall trees uttering their well-remembered "Don't scold so, sukey. Don't scold so, sukey. Don't. ". On the nearby pond one day were Mute Swans and always numbers of Coots; a pair of handsome Great-crested Grebes with their stripy youngsters and several Tufted Duck giving diving displays while Mallard families sunned themselves on the bank.

Visits to other parts of the country brought sightings of Swallows, House Martins and Swifts; the flash of a Kingfisher darting up-stream; a Mistle Thrush, Garden Warbler, Dunnock and Spotted Flycatcher. Elsewhere it was the unmistakable laughing call of the Green Woodpecker (supposed, like the Koel here, to herald the much-needed rain); a pair of red-legged Partridges perched atop a straw bale high on the South Downs and gulls at the coast or following the plough, just to name a few.

#### "BIRDS AND BUGS"

Working in the more isolated regions of Australia does have its advantages. Very early one morning (3 a.m.) the lights around the drilling rig were engulfed by insects. Thousands of insects. When the sun came up, the insects hit the ground and about ten minutes later, the Fork-tailed Kites (and a few Brown Falcons and Ravens) hit the bugs. In an area the size of about 2.5 football-fields would have been close to five hundred Fork-tailed Kites madly picking away at this feast upon the ground. An hour later the kites had dispersed and the usual number of up to fifty were beginning to ride the thermals above the oil field. Other interesting sightings recorded in the Jackson area were Chestnut-crowned Babblers, Brown-headed Honeyeaters, and Singing Honeyeaters.
