NATURE SEARCH 2001 CONFERENCE 23 and 24 October 1993

As many of our members are keen naturesearchers, here is a short report on a conference Ann Shore and I attended at the Maroon Outdoor Education Centre south of Boonah.

Held in a beautiful area below the rugged grandeur of the mountains of the Senic Rim in the Mt Barney National Park the conference boasted a galaxy of well-known known naturalists and appearently it is quite rare for them to be found together. It was quite interesting hearing them comparing notes or disagreeing for instance - the merits of only using latin when naming specimens.

Although the contributors were all incredibly well qualified and experienced, Ann and I came away with the impression that all of them shared the same common passion whatever their interests.

It soon became obvious that most of them possessed an almost missionary zeal in trying to convert the majority of the 'birdos' present to become fervent believers in whatever persuasion they represented. In the short space of two days we all started to enjoy frogs, toads, bats, reptiles and dragonflies and anything else as long as moved.

In fact Nic Natrass explained that every waterhole we've explored for birds should also have dragonflies. I've checked recently and he's absolutely correct.

Two days was all too short to take it all in, but we tried, such was the quality of the speakers. The bird fraternity was well represented with Greg Czechura, Graham Pizzey, Glen Threlfo and Glen Holmes. Graham is a conservationist first, and birdo secondly. Glen Threlfo is well known for his videos and work at O'Reilly's and shattered any illusions we had about filming with a hilarious illustrated talk regarding the Jacana and of course the Lyrebird. Glen Holmes is an outstanding birdo currently working on a recovery plan for the endangered Coxen/Fig-Parrot.It seems things aren't looking too good for this shy bird as Glen has investigated all possible sightings over the last twenty years.

GLen then presented a very sobering explanation of the work done by the Raptor Association's Rehabilitation Unit. Injured birds go through a 10 step process to furecovery. Unfortunately the magnificent Brown Falcon and Brahminy Kite exhibited could never be released because some unthinking person's intervention

A hectic two days and I urge all Naturesearchers to attend if held again in 1994.
