EDITORIAL:

The issue of outing venues is always a difficult one. For the keener birders who have visited the local hotspots frequently and have seen most of the species on offer, local outings now hold little appeal. To cater for everybody, we will continue with the popular mid-monthly local outing and rely on a more distant and exotic locations at the end of the month to satisfy the more adventurous and the 'listers'. We hope the locations on the back page will meet with your approval.

Remember its your club, so please inform the executive if you would care to visit some special locale. Also, I can see from the members' bird notes that many of you are extremely mobile, so, what about it, how about a short entry regarding that special species sighted or district visited?

NOVEMBER OUTING, BRISBANE WADERS and STRADBROKE ISLAND - 26/27.11.94

This venue is my favourite outing of the TBO year and, judging by the responses of the participants, likely to become an annual event. The format followed this year was identical to that of our inaugural Stradbroke Outing in 1993. Members chose either a two day option or a single days' birding to Stradbroke on the Sunday.

One carload ventured forth on the Saturday with various stops en route to arrive at Don's place at Thorneside, midday Saturday. Our first stop was Minden Lagoon where we encountered an inland drought refugee, a single Black-tailed Native-hen. There has been an implosion of this species into SE

Queensland recently with prior records from Wivenhoe and Atkinson's Dams. Our next stop was Archerfield Aerodrome where Oriental Plover and Little Curlew have been reported of late. Unfortunately the plovers were not to be seen but 32 Little Curlews obliged the company. On then to Sherwood Arboretum for good views of Baillon's Crake but no Little Bittern, our mid-morning idyll being disrupted by a Maori tug-o-war team in full cry, a formidable sight.

At Don's house we were joined by a Swiss visitor, Alex Huber who joined us for the weekend. Saturday afternoon was taken with wader watching around Wynnum, Wellington Point, Lytton areas but little of note was observed except for five White-winged Terns at the Wynnum Marina.

Early Sunday morning, the Saturday venturers were joined by several day-trippers to catch the 6:45 am barge to Stradbroke Island. The crossing was uneventful, unlike this leg of the voyage on last year's outing when Short-tailed Shearwaters were about in abundance. The first stop on the island was Amity Point where good birding was had. Species encountered here included Pied Oystercatcher, White-cheeked Honeyeater, a pair of White-breasted Woodswallows nesting atop a bollard, Mangrove Honeyeaters and Chestnut Teal. The humping backs of several grazing Dugong broke out to sea and a young Osprey was observed to take a Spotted Butterfish, Scatophagus argus. Two Whistling Kites so harried the Osprey that it abandoned its prey with one of the kites making an ineffectual attempt at retrieving the fish. The mud-flats and sandbars hereabouts were festooned with those great little crustaceans, the Soldier Crab, Mictyria longicarpus whilst an exposed clump of Eel Grass sheltered one content of the larger and much more aggressive relations in the guise of a jenny Mud Crab, Scylla serrata.

From Amity Point we drove towards Point Lookout stopping at an area of heath to examine 'Don's sundew spot'. Two species of these bizarre carnivores were on show viz. Forked Sundew, Drosera binata and Spoonleaf Sundew, D. spathulata. On the tip of Point Lookout, telescopes were mounted and the sea-birding started in earnest. Once again the Point produced the goods as, over the next two hours, some very special sea-birds presented themselves to the onlookers. Particular species of note included several Short-tailed Shearwaters, four or five Common Noddies and the highlight of the day a lone Least Frigatebird, an uncommon species to SE Queensland waters. Bottle-nosed Dolphin and Green Turtle were about throughout our stay. After a protracted and leisurely lunch we headed back to Dunwich for the mid-afternoon barge home, the end of the idyll. One question remains to be asked, that being, "Alex, how do you intend getting a very smelly Spotted Porcupine Fish through Swiss Customs?"

Lastly, I would like to thank Graham and Nicci Thompson and Ann Shore for the use of their vehicles on the day, and Don Gaydon for his hospitality over the weekend.

UNDER AFRICAN SKIES

It started in earnest, again under the Southern Cross, on a trip to South Africa, at the end of 1992. As I drove along with South African friends and avid bird observers, Pearl and Derek Scotney to our fenced camp in the Kruger National Park. Past the flat-topped thorn trees, we saw movement in the understorey and after some concentrated viewing, the barely discernible coat of a leopard with its kill, a small antelope. That would have been exciting enough had Pearl and Derek not pointed out the heavy, untidy Lappet-faced vultures *Torgus tracheliotus*, lurking and squabbling for prime position, waiting for the leopard to leave any remains of its kill so that they could begin their hungry feasting.

And from that moment my binoculars took in an ever-fascinating spectrum of feathered life. Looking for birds in the Kruger National Park was an unexpected, exciting and infinitely rewarding activity, on a trip where my primary ambition had been to see giraffes, baboons, monkeys, elephants, hippos, zebras, lions, leopards and cheetahs. Soon I had the binoculars focusing on the large Yellow-billed Hornbills *Tockus flavirostris*, the delicately coloured Carmine Bee-eaters *Merops nubicoides*, the soaring Martial Eagles *Polemaetus bellicosus*, the tall, grey and gangly Secretary Birds *Sagittarius*

rpentarius, the Hadeda Ibis Hagedashia hagedash, the Purple-crested Louries Gallirex porphyreolophus, the Paradise Whydahs Steganura paradisaea with their long black tails floating behind them, the busy nest-builders - the Lesser Masked Weavers Ploceus intermedius.

And so amongst those well-known African animals I began to appreciate the other occupiers of the savannah. What a thrill it was as I continued my journey around South Africa, to see the shimmering turquoise of a Woodland Kingfisher Halcyon senegalensis as it returned to feed its young, to follow the haunting calls of two adult African Fish Eagles Haliaetus vocifer with a juvenile, as they perched in a tree, on sunset, beside the Vergesof an Eastern Cape river, to observe a handsome Hoopoe Upupa africana looking for food in a garden lawn, to hear the Helmeted Guinea Fowl Numida meleagris and its unmistakable rattling call and to listen to the resonating and soothing sound of the Cape Turtle Dove Streptopelia capicola.

Here was a haven amidst the political tensions, not untouched by its ramifications, but for me a very special beginning for a still-rewarding and treasured activity.

CONDITIONS: 50% overcast, windy. Visibility good.

COMMENTS: Single bird observed in company of small group of Sharp-tailed Sandpipers feeding

on shoreline below exposed dam wall. Closed to within 5 m of subject for clear and protracted views. Noted fieldmarks clearly especially grey breast, upper belly clearly demarked from white middle/lower belly. Heavily streaked breast observed. Bird observed in same general area next week. Other field marks remarked in this period included upright stance, "budgerigar-like" alarm call and larger, (than Sharptailed Sandpiper), down-curved bill with yellowish base.
