Editorial

The Annual General Meeting was held on Monday evening, 12th October and the President's and Treasurer's reports are in this newsletter. Thanks to those who attended and we are pleased to welcome some new blood on the executive, viz, Helen Wilson as another Committee Member and Diane Seeney as Librarian. The rest of the executive remains the same.

It was one of the more interesting AGM's in recent times thanks to our guest speakers, Rachel McFadyen and Judy McCaughley, from Department of Natural Resources. They presented their case for proposing that a Darling Downs Owl Action Group be formed to promote the placement of owl nesting boxes on farms on the Darling Downs. The aim is to increase the number of owls to achieve a greater control of mice.

We were fortunate also to have **Ray Smith** from Maleny attend. Ray's company is marketing John Young's new "**Wings of Silence**" video, which is about Australian owls. It includes footage on the use of owl nest boxes to increase the owl population in controlling Cane Rats in north Queensland. Ray has kindly offered to donate some of the money from sales of the video back to to the club. Simply mention TBO when purchasing it from him. Further details about the video, the project and our involvement will be detailed at a later date.

Birding news includes Little Button-quails seen near the bottom of TableTop. There are only a handful of records of this species for the area. I saw my first Black-necked Stork in ages at Gatton (Lake Apex) last Saturday and another two were seen at at Karrasch's Lagoon nearby. Eastern Golden Plovers have also been seen recently at these two waterbodies.

Also included in the newsletter is a report on the **Sundown NP** outing from Richard Thomis, and the **1997 October species census report** to whet your appetite for this weekend's census.

The other great news is that the club was bequeathed \$250 by our late Secretary, Ann Shore. The club will ensure it is put to good use, probably towards that long-awaited publication!

Outing Report - Sundown National Park, 28/29 August 1998.

With much anticipation, Pat Solomon and I got off to a headstart by driving down to Sundown NP early Friday afternoon. We stopped to watch a flock of Little Woodswallows en route and saw Diamond Firetails just outside the park.

The drive through the park was very rewarding with good views of Turquoise Parrots feeding beside the road, Brown Treecreepers often on the road, Yellow-rumped Thornbill and a departing Little Eagle. We Met Peter Haselgrove, our guide for the next day, at his house while multiple honeyeaters, mainly White-plumed and Spiny-cheeked, fed in his garden. White-winged Choughs frolicked nearby.

We spent the rest of the daylight exploring the camp-site surrounds before quickly putting up our tents. The Thompsons then arrived at the adjacent site and spent the next several hours mooring down their caravan and attaching the various annexes. Dinner and port were consumed as the evening's entertainment went on. Eventually, and exhausted by their efforts, the Thompsons staggered over to join us around the camp fire. Later though, we had supper in their luxurious home away from home, before reluctantly returning to our tents.

Our early morning walk produced Red-winged Parrot, Leaden Flycatcher and Speckled Warbler. We then met up with an excited Nicci who had found a roosting owl. At various times, and angles, we were almost persuaded that it was a Barking Owl, but after getting the photos back we had to agree that it was just a Boobook.

We then caught up with Peter and his family and Ken and Fiona Wells to start the outing proper. Disappointed at not getting a new species with the owl, Nicci had to be restrained from joining a Bible-reading group as they furtively headed into the bush. Crested Shrike-tit and Fan-tailed Cuckoo were soon seen and several Wedge-tailed Eagles soared overhead.

Peter was also able to track down a White-browed Babbler, just before Nicci, her enthusiasm for birding rekindled, heard a Horsfield's Bronze-Cuckoo. As this was a bird that had been eluding me for some time, I took off with Nicci. She duly found the cuckoo, as well as the Hooded Robin, and I was in the envious position of seeing two new birds at once. We were also treated to a delightful male Red-capped Robin, Dusky and Little Woodswallows, Brown Goshawk and several more Hooded Robins.

It was a terrific trip and we were very lucky to have Peter guide us around. It was spoilt only by one member struggling to locate Sundown NP in time, especially after she had laughed at her work-mates for camping there.

Reports from Annual General Meeting, 12th October 1998

President's Report

This past year has seen change on several fronts. The secretary's position changed with the unfortunate illness of Michael Hirst's wife. I would like to thank Michael, the ultimate club member, for taking over Ann's position after her death a year ago. Firstly for his overall enthusiasm and secondly for the many new members he recruited via U3A. I would also like to thank Nicci Thompson for taking over Michael's executive position at short notice and for Keith Kerr similarly in U3A. Incidentally, Ann has bequeathed the club \$250.

On the weather front, I think we would agree that the drought is over, but finding our feathered friends locally has become just a little more difficult, given the amount of water around.

However club members did manage to see Osprey at Warwick, Grey Falcon, Musk Duck, Turquoise Parrot and Little Wattlebird in the Lockyer Valley, Swift Parrots in Toowoomba and surprise, surprise Bell Miners south of Toowoomba. Especially exciting in January was an injured Gould's Petrel, looked after by carer, Clare Gover, a TBO member.

TBOI also took part in many worthwhile activities.. Two surveys for Regent Honeyeater and Swift Parrot in the region between Stanthorpe and Karara as well as the on-going Murray-Darling Project, Queensland Wader Study Group and surveys of the three local dams for the Toowoomba City Council on a quarterly basis. Although we didn't find the Regents or Swifts around Karara, we did locate White-winged Fairy-wrens at Coolmunda Dam courtesy of Lorraine Welch a birder from that area. These birds were subsequently seen by several club members on the September Outing.

In May, several members participated in and enjoyed a Wildlife Rehabilitation Workshop. The club also helped celebrate World Environment Day in June represented by Olive and Jim Booth, Sharyn and Alex Fredriks, Jirik Haselgrove and myself on a very moist day at Lake Annand. Thanks to all.

In August, Birds Australia finally launched the new Atlas Project with Nicci Thompson as a Regional Organizer for southern, inland Queensland. I urge all members to participate in this worthwhile four-year project, as it has been twenty years with much habitat change since the last one. See Nicci in order to register.

Once again, the Unleaded Petrels urged on by Pat McConnell finished in the placings by coming third in the **QOSI Twitchathon**, accounting for 209 species in 24 hours. Congratulations must also go to Pat for being highly commended in 1997 Australian Wildlife Photographer of the Year competition. Congratulations also to Don Gaydon on his recent engagement to Suzanne.

Over the year the club has travelled far and wide to Stradbroke Island, Moreton Bay, Bowenville, Peach Trees SF near Jimna, Sundown NP and Coolmunda Dam on **monthly excursions** as well as to several local venues. Thanks to all leaders including some newer members. This month, the **Annual Species Count** will be held and as always volunteers are needed. Contact Michael Atzeni if you can help.

To help community awareness regarding the TBOI, an **introductory kit** produced by editor Michael Atzeni will be available this month. The club will also promote itself courtesy of Klaus Uhlenhut's internet site **ausbirds.com.au**. Thanks to Nicci for allowing us to use her internet address. Currently several members have internet access and also utilize the user group **birding-aus.com.au**. as well as being prolific e-mailers.

This morning I sent a letter via Lloyd Nielsen to Rod Welford, Minister for the Environment regarding Mareeba Shire Council's decision to lop several old gum trees at the entrance to Kingfisher Park at Julatten. These trees contain at least 17 species including nesting Lesser Sooty Owls.

In conclusion, I would like to thank all club members who have helped in any way, executive members especially Michael Hirst and now Nicci as secretary, Michael Atzeni for the excellent newsletter, Gloria as treasurer, Pat our records officer as well as Olive and Jack who are always supportive.
